The State of Florida was awarded a Race to the Top grant from the U.S. Department of Education.

By 2012, create a centralized portal to serve as the gateway to publicly accessible information, and to secure confidential applications via single sign-on.

The Florida Department of Education, in partnership with the Race to the Top Single Sign-On Implementation Committee, has been working since Fall 2011 to design the Department's single sign-on solution.

The Single Sign-On Implementation Committee is comprised of technical and leadership staff from school districts, charter schools, and educational consortia and is representative of Florida's diversity.






